2024.059 How the Truth has prospered at Cotteridge Meeting

We have received a report from Cotteridge Meeting informing us of how the Truth has prospered over the last year. The report reads as follows:

We have been asked by the Area Meeting to share the main activities of our Meeting during 2023. We are asked to include how our Meeting has flourished during the past year as well as any important challenges which we have faced, and things we may have done to overcome them.

How our Meeting has flourished:

• Meeting for worship - we have a regular Meeting for worship, well attended by both children and adults, with a children's group of about 6 children. We are glad to have a Meeting with a large age range and hope to create an intergenerational community where all feel welcome. Our gathered Meeting for worship is precious to us and we would like to help each other find ways into the stillness so that we can become faithful Quakers, finding the ways of God.

- We have been pleased to welcome some newcomers to our meeting and are working to make sure they are integrated into our community.
- The depth of our Meeting for worship and our community are enhanced by sessions before
 Meeting for worship and deep conversations afterwards over a cup of tea. We also enjoy our
 regular all age shared lunches and our monthly coffee mornings add to our pastoral work.
 We also have a number of small groups meeting in people's homes. We have a regular
 group of Friends who meet to discuss the joys and challenges of ageing.
- Warm Welcome established in October 2023, it has been slow to attract people. This has
 now evolved to become a monthly Create and Connect event on the last Wednesday of the
 month. All are welcome for craft and companionship. Warm drinks and light refreshments
 are provided.
- Spending time together in 2023 both in worship and in other ways all age gathering at Purley Chase, Woodbrooke where you are Ministry, Worship and After Word, Saturdays to share together.
- Our regular newsletter enables us to keep in touch with future activities.
- Our garden continues to give us great pleasure.
- Several Friends in our Meeting support Talking Friends and this commitment to inclusive practice is appreciated.

Challenges:

- We find it difficult to find enough people willing and able to give service to our community. We have found ways to reduce the number of formal appointments and reduce the required length of service.
- We are without a warden and are discerning the right way forward both for the maintenance of our Meeting House and for our bungalow.
- We continue to try to improve the technical ways of accessing our meeting including for those with hearing impairments.
- Our children's group has a wide age range and it is sometimes difficult to support those at both ends of the range at the same time.

2024.060 Reflections and discernment from the morning's workshop

The theme of the workshop, facilitated by the Responding to Racist Group, was "Climate Change is Racist", which is the title of a book that is highly recommended reading. We were reminded that the Restore Nature Now walk was taking place in London today. We started by watching three short videos featuring the Nigerian activist Vanessa Nakate, at Davos in 2020, COP27 in 2022, and Paris in 2023. Vanessa was famously edited out of a photograph of her standing alongside four white activists before the photograph was released to the media. Vanessa made the key point that although Africa is the least emitter of carbon it is the most affected by climate change. After we discussed the title of the book in pairs, the members of the R2R group shared their personal thoughts about the book with us. The planning group had devoted a lot of time to preparation, meeting four times, and had found the journey valuable. Some members of the group had initially had reservations about the link between Racism and Climate Change, but were pleased with the outcome of the workshop.

Some of the points made were that Racism and Colonialisation, which have caused so much damage, link with almost all of our Quaker Testimonies, including Equality & Community, Truth & Integrity, Stewardship of the Earth, Simplicity, and Peace. Maps of CO₂ emissions and vulnerability to climate change demonstrate the disparity between the two. There are three types of racism, personal, institutional and structural and we learnt about the "empathy gap" where we were encouraged to step outside our boxes and make the connection.

This presentation was followed by a further discussion in larger groups, and a feedback session.

In a closing session we were challenged to consider what we are called to do. Friends were encouraged to visit the Zero Hours website, with an appeal for asking local candidates to support the Climate and Nature Bill: https://www.zerohour.uk/. It is very easy to join the petition. Friends also made cards to send to our local MP when elected, and origami birds made from a sheet of paper with relevant texts of our choosing. We were also able to take some wildflower seeds (sufficient to populate a square metre) to plant in suitable spaces, hopefully without destroying any rare species.

In the period of reflection this afternoon we were reminded of the need for having safe and brave spaces to share feelings, and that the process of discernment is not linear. Also, given that greed is at the heart of the problem, our testimony of simplicity is very important.

2024.064 Friends acting under concern

The trial of four Friends from Central England Area Meeting for action at the Telford Arms Fair 2023 has been postponed and we understand that a new date of 20th January 2025 has been set. The SDSC Arms Fair UK 2024 is at Telford International Centre on 6th, & 7th November, and Jo Hindley has asked for practical and moral support with a protest. Further details will be communicated via the WhatsApp group.

Two Just Stop Oil campaigners, one of whom was our Friend Rajan Naidu, sprayed coloured powder on Stonehenge near Salisbury, Wiltshire, on Wednesday 19th June. We are pleased to learn that neither the stones nor lichen were harmed. We uphold Rajan at this time. We will return to a discussion of the methods of expressing protest at a future Area Meeting.

2024.065 Meeting for Sufferings Report for Saturday 1st June 2024

We have received a report from Claire Bowman on the Meeting for Sufferings meeting held on 1st June, which Claire noted was the last in the current triennium. Some of the key points from the report are:-

Minutes from Area Meetings -

- South Wales, encouraging Area Meetings to sign up to Stop Ecocide International.
- General Meeting for Scotland on the matter of Indefinite Imprisonment for Public Protection, noting that the framework for dealing with offenders is different in Scotland.
- London Young Adult Friends concern about the government's Consultation on Gender Questing Children.
- Sussex West Area Meeting's concern about the difficulties that Yearly Meeting Trustees have faced following their decision to recommend that this year's Salter Lecture should not take place at Friends House during Yearly Meeting

Later in the meeting the new clerk to Trustees, Marisa Johnson, spoke about the abuse which she feels that Trustees have personally received on account of doing their work, such as over the

cancellation of the Salter Lecture due to concern about the consequences of having Jeremy Corbyn as a speaker.

With regard to the Quaker Marriage Declaration, the matter is still at Area Meetings for consultation.

The Quaker Concern over Population which was formed after Britain Yearly Meeting's Canterbury Commitment in 2011, has generated some controversy, with some members of Young Friends General Meeting being concerned about the name of the group.

A large part of the afternoon was taken up with consideration of Quaker work in Palestine and Israel where Quakers have been actively working since 1934. A paper was presented by Stephanie Hart, Middle East Programmes Manager, about the UK Quaker involvement in the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme. There has been much trauma to deal with since 7th October for both the ecumenical accompaniers and the staff who assist them. A Friend has reminded us of the dangers of using language such as Apartheid and Genocide, which conflate current events with events in history. Also of the fine line between legitimate criticism of the Israeli government and anti-Semitism. Many Jewish people in UK are feeling under threat.

Claire concluded her report by saying that she is thankful to have been asked to serve as the Central England Quakers' representative on Meeting for Sufferings. She wished the new reps, Margot Williams and Nicholas Paton Philip, joy and fulfilment in their roles.

We thank Claire Bowman for her service as our representative. We are aware of the changes being proposed to central structures and the concerns that these have generated. We uphold our new representatives as they start their service on Meeting for Sufferings at a difficult time, and also support those going to Yearly Meeting where these matters will be raised.

2024.066 Reports of Ecumenical and Interfaith Work

The booklet which has been tabled today has been created from a large number of inputs, and is a very comprehensive audit of current activity - even though it is 24 pages long, reading it is well worth the effort. We thank the individual contributors, and are pleased to note that all of our Local Meetings have provided reports. We also thank Helen Waters, Business Support Administrator, for compiling and editing the booklet.

The first 19 pages are reports from individuals working with other churches and faiths on specific committees or groups, or who have been involved in particular events.

In her report Claire Bowman notes that there are Friends dotted around our Local Meetings who are members of Churches Together groups or Interfaith groups but each operating within the context of their local area and perhaps not thinking much about relating what they are doing to the rest of the Area Meeting.

She observes that:-

If we were to tell each other more about what we have been doing we could learn from each other's experience and encourage each other. Getting to know people from other faiths and denominations shouldn't threaten our own spiritual orientation. Rather we should be strengthened on our journey by having to explain to others what we think, do and believe and potentially enrich our own practice by learning about the expression of their religious background. Besides, there are issues which we all face, such as climate change, on which we all agree. Care for the planet is central to all the major faiths. How much stronger our presence will be to bring about mutually desired change if we all work together.

Hopefully the publication of this booklet is a step towards addressing this concern.

It is encouraging to see individual Quakers not only participating in ecumenical and interfaith organisations but in many cases taking leadership roles. We need to make sure that as these Friends seek to be released from service other Friends are encouraged to come forward to continue the good work.

The final 5 pages of the booklet are reports from Local Meetings, most of whom are active in their local Churches Together Groups. Some of the reports demonstrate that this form of outreach is more about giving people of other faiths accurate information about Quakers and their form of worship as it is about encouraging people to follow our way. This was emphasised when Warwick Meeting took part in a Faith Trail, and came across some serious misconceptions about Quakers and their worship. In one case a Local Meeting has been discouraged from being part of Churches Together due to a member church objecting to our lack of a creed, but this seems to be a minority problem, and most Quaker Meetings are made welcome. It is heart-warming to note that many Meetings are not just maintaining relationships with other churches and faith groups but working with them actively on local projects and concerns, also that Meeting Houses are used to host meetings and events. It is of interest that one Meeting in particular engages actively with faith groups that hire rooms at the Meeting House. It is also good to see that Chaplaincy is recognised as a key part of the way we work with other faiths for a common purpose.

We have been reminded about "Faith in the Future" published in 2016 which encouraged Quakers to work collaboratively, appreciating that we can't do everything on our own.

Hilary Johnson referred to the questions in her Pray 24 Brum report, and she hopes to be released from this work soon. Anyone interested in taking up the role should speak to Hilary about it. With regard to her Council of Christians and Jews report, she is willing to continue for a further year.

Not all of the roles are AM appointments, but we need to value them, and perhaps create a new category of roles that are not mandatory but supported by Area Meeting.

Chris Martin spoke about the Birmingham Faiths Climate Action partnership, and we ask Chris to prepare a short briefing paper for our next meeting.

Finally, we should celebrate the work which is being done, and we thank all those who are doing it in our name.
