A confident Quaker Voice

In each newsletter I try to offer a few ideas around a question that has come up at several Local or Area Meetings. This time it's 'How can we speak confidently about our faith and spirituality?'. There are lots of reasons why we don't always do this – with each other, and with people who are not Quakers. We don't want to offend anyone, we're all on our own spiritual path, we don't have the words to describe our experience, there isn't time. But it's important that we try. It's important for our Quaker communities that we know each other better, and it's important if we are going to be able to talk about our faith to others, if they are interested.

Here's a few ideas:

The activity on page 11-13 of the <u>Outreach Handbook</u> is a great place to start. Friends are asked to sit or stand in concentric circles, and ask and answer questions. Perhaps you could run this for 20 minutes after meeting some time? If it's a small meeting you can just talk in a whole group.

Does your meeting provide opportunities for Friends to learn together, and talk about their faith and spiritual lives? Could you have regular discussions about a passage from Quaker Faith and Practice after meeting, or over breakfast, or meet in small groups at another time in the week?

There are lots of resources that you could use, so here are just a few that I've come across that might be helpful.

Being Quaker Doing Quaker – good questions and discussion ideas, wouldn't take too much planning.

<u>Sharing our Journeys</u> Although it's a few years old, there are some really good ideas in this resource, especially the sections on 'Exploring Spirituality' and 'Exploring God'. It was written with young adults in mind but lots of the activities would work, or could be adapted, to multi-generational groups.

Let's explore the Quaker Way You could have a discussion about the picture and text on the first double page. What does this mean for each of us? How do we experience of The Light/God/The Spirit?

Becoming Friends is a longer and more in-depth course that you could run in your own meeting, or in collaboration with others.

<u>A Quaker Take on God</u> podcast episode might be a good starting point for sharing our experience/understanding of God.
